Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

I recently read that Passover is the oldest-known holiday in Western civilization. And, perhaps, it is the most significant and profound of all of our Jewish festivals as well. Celebrating freedom and liberation from slavery, teaching us to welcome and share with the poor, are indeed important values. Since the September 11th terrorist strike on America, the ideals of freedom, democracy and human dignity have indeed taken on even greater meaning.



Surveys have shown that more American Jews observe Passover than any other Jewish holiday. Perhaps this is so because it takes place in the home (and involves eating!), but also because it is joyous and given over to wise lessons. It may even be that deep in many people's consciousness there is also annual rejoicing over the religious, political, social and even economic lessons that Passover teaches us. As Jews we are a time-centered, cycleoriented people. During Passover we celebrate springtime, freedom, and family, joining together to remember the history of our people. We tell a story of the past while we exist in the present; but we tell it with hope and optimism for the future.

The optimism that comes from the new sights and smells of spring are, in a sense, reinforced in a Jewish context by Passover. Many of the Seder rituals exude this upbeat feeling. When we break the middle matzah to save half of it for dessert (the afikoman), we are actually learning to save and plan for the future. We enjoy some benefits now and others later, once we have earned them. Similarly, we sing "This year we are here, next year may we be in Jerusalem. This year we are still slaves, next year may we all be free." Some rabbis comment that we can read Jerusalem, in Hebrew Yeru-sha-la-yim, as "ir-shalem" or "ir-shalom", the city of peace. We pray that there will be peace, not only in Jerusalem, but in every city, wherever we may be.

We also sing about Elijah the Prophet, who according to legend, is the bearer of good tidings. He appears in times of trouble to promise relief and redemption and to plant hope in our hearts. A nice custom you may want to add to your Seder is to have each person pour from his/her wine cup into the Cup of Elijah. This symbolizes that each one of us must work toward peace and harmony in our world. You may also like to do this at your Seder this year, thinking about how you personally, can have a role in creating Shalom now and in the future.

My family joins me in wishing you and your families a happy and joyous Pesach holiday! I hope you'll join us for the Community Seder at the Temple on the second night of Passover, Tuesday evening, March 30th.

PASSOVER BUZZ WORDS

CHAMETZ – *Chametz* refers to any food with leavening. The Torah instructs us to eat matzah and abstain from *chametz* during Pesach as a reminder of the haste with which we fled Egypt. During the week of Passover, we are a people in transition. The slavery of Egypt has been left behind, but the Promised Land lies far ahead in the future, and during this week, we must travel light.



MITZRAYIM – *Mitzravim* is the Hebrew name for both modern and ancient Egypt. At the seder we tell the story of Yitziyat Mitzrayim, our going forth from Egypt. Because of it, we know that no people should be oppressed. The Torah reminds us countless times that we must treat people who are vulnerable with justice, compassion, and generosity "because you were strangers in the land of Egypt." The Hebrew word *Mitzrayim* can also be translated as "narrow straits." This reading allowed the kabbalists to attach the story of their personal, spiritual journeys to the national, master narrative. Passover becomes the time that we examine the places in our lives where we feel "stuck" and seek to pare down our souls to their essence so that we can make our passage to freedom.

HAGGADAH – The *Haggadah* which is our quide through the seder, contains questions, songs, instructions for ritual, but most of all, the narration of Yitziyat Mitzrayim, the Exodus. Haggadah means "telling." It is through the telling and the ritual re-enactment of our story that we re-experience our liberation. The Haggadah tells our story, and, in case we have missed this central point, it reminds us that "in every generation, one ought to regard oneself as if we personally had gone out of Egypt... It was not our ancestors alone that God redeemed, but the Holy One has redeemed us with them as well." We are instructed to recount the story in a personal way to our children, "Because of this that God did for me when I went out from Eqypt."

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT PASSOVER

- Until very recently, matzah was round. Now almost all matzot in America are square!
- In Israel, Jews observe only one Seder, while most Jews in the diaspora observe two.
- The word *Haggadah* comes from a Hebrew word meaning "to tell" because it tells the story of the Jews being freed from slavery in Egypt. The *Haggadah* used on Passover is one of the few books in Jewish religious life that contains pictures. Even *Haggadot* printed centuries ago contain illustrations.
- The first *Haggadah* produced by a printing press rather than by hand was issued in Fano, Italy in 1505.
- In 1940 a Passover service was broadcast on television for the first time.
- In the past 450 years more than 500 different editions of the *Haggadah* have been printed throughout the world!
- The original purpose of making little holes in matzot was to prevent them from rising while baking.
- Nisan, the month in which Passover is observed, is the 7th month in the Jewish calendar. In biblical times, Nisan was counted as the first month of the Jewish year!
- In the *Haggadah*, "unleavened bread" is the translation of the Hebrew word *matzah*. However, *Matzah* now appears as an English word in many dictionaries.
- During the days of the Talmud it was the custom to bake matzot in different shapes and figures.
- There are four Hebrew names for the Passover holiday. They are:
- Pesach
- Zeman Cheyruteynu (Season of our Freedom)
- Chag ha'Aviv (Festival of Spring)
- Chag Ha-Matzot (Festival of Matzot).

Take a Shabbat/Spring Break by Cantor Michael Russ

These days, when I listen to the News, I hear all that is terrible in the world. If I listen to "progressive radio" or "conservative radio," I hear all that is wrong in the world and especially in our country. If I only listen to music or silly banter between hosts, I wonder if I'm not paying enough attention to what is going on around me. The same thing is true with television.

That is what I like about Shabbat. Shabbat should be a politics and news free day, once each week. When I go to Friday night services, I pray for the world, my family and friends. I think about how fortunate I am. I have food to eat. I have clothes to wear. I have a roof over my head. On Shabbat I take time from everything else and say, "Thank you G-d for all that I have." For me, this is very uplifting. Strangely I manage to set aside time for many things. There are certain T.V. shows I need to schedule to watch. I have to know when to go shopping for groceries and schedule my car for maintenance. We schedule when to eat, when to sleep so many things.... But when do I schedule time to simply stop and appreciate what I have?

Matzo Oatmeal Cookies

During the eight days of Passover, foods that contain ordinary flour, legumes or grains are on the "no" list. But a kid's got to have cookies! These pretend **oatmeal cookies** uses mazto and are crisp and yummy. They can get popped into a lunch box for an afternoon treat.

Ingredients

- 1 cup (250 mL) matzoh farfel (or finely crumbled matzohs)
- 1 cup (250 mL) matzoh meal
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) sugar
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped walnuts
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) raisins
- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) cinnamon
- 2 eggs
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) oil

Cooking Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (180 degrees C). Grease a cookie sheet or line with parchment paper.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix together the matzoh farfel, matzoh meal, sugar, walnuts and raisins.

In a smaller bowl, beat together the eggs and the oil. Stir into the farfel mixture, tossing until the mixture is very well blended. Drop by teaspoon onto the prepared baking sheet and bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until lightly browned.

Makes about 2 dozen cookies.


